Also, R. S. Lee, the author of *Your Growing Children and Religion* says:

"The first seven years [of life] constitute the period for laying the foundations of religion. This is the most important period in the whole of a person's life in determining his later religious attitudes."

Research has proven the Bible verse: "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it." (Proverbs 22:6, KJV)

Lessons in living learned from boy

By Heather S. Liafsha— I've been a nurse for 10 years. Many times, I have questioned if I chose the right profession. I became a nurse because I wanted to work with terminally ill children. I knew that I couldn't cure them but hoped that I could in some way make their life a little easier. Unfortunately, my career path didn't take me to the children that I had always wanted to help until last year.

I started a new job as a liaison for a home infusion company. I was excited about the challenges and the new people that I would meet. I had no idea that job would change my life.

I met Joshua in October 1998. He was a wonderful 4-year-old with big, bright eyes. He had a heart as pure as gold and an infectious laugh that came from deep within his belly. Joshua never met a stranger, and everyone that knew him fell in love with him.

Joshua was fighting a brain tumor that was first diagnosed when he was about 10 months old. Chemotherapy radiation, IV sticks and blood draws were a normal everyday occurrence. There were times during his life that the monster that occupied his brain robbed him of his speech, his ability to walk, and his ability to play like a normal child his age. But Joshua was not afraid of that monster. He fought bravely like David fighting Goliath.

I became close friends with Joshua and his family. Every time I visited, he would give me a big hug and thank me for his medicine. No other patient had ever done that! As I became closer to Josh, I learned that he had a tremendous love and faith in God. I often wondered how someone who had been through so much could retain such a faith. It was a mystery to me how such a wonderful God could cause

such pain in such a small child. However, Joshua did not have any hard feelings or anger about his disease or fate, not did his family. Because of his illness, he was thankful for everyday that God let him spend with inability to walk at times, or the fact that the very treatment that was supposed to help him made him extremely sick. Instead, he focused on the fact that the sun came up that day, or that God let it rain to water the flowers, or that someone remembered to bring

sight. I cried all the way home that day.

I have many wonderful memories of Joshua. Each one is very special and dear to my heart. But what I remember most about this special child is his zest for life and his love of God. I never imagined that at my age I could learn something from a 4-year-old. But I learned more about life, hope, love, and living in the short nine months that I knew Joshua than in the 30 years that I have been alive.

He taught me to live everyday to the fullest, to be thankful for the sun, the rain, the birds and flowers, my family and friends, and the little things we all take for granted. He taught me to hope that the tallest mountains can be climbed, and the meanest monster can be tamed, and to pray to a God that has a master plan for all of us. But mostly, Joshua taught me how to love. He loved everything and everyone unconditionally. He had a love of life unsurpassed by most adults. He loved everyday regardless of pain and accepted that fact that each day may be his last. He loved his mother very

much, and looked forward to being her guardian angel.

Joshua made me realize that I did choose the right career. For the first time, I have found meaning in my life and in my career. I have taken a new position with the hospital where Joshua spent a large portion of his life. Hopefully, I can soon work again with those special children.

I learned a lot from that special, bright-eyed-4-year-old. But in the end, his death taught me how to live.

I used to bring Josh balloons when I delivered his medicine. He would always share his balloons with his cousins, or anyone else who was there. If there were any left over, and there always were, he would take them outside and release them in the air. Once I asked him why he let all his balloons go. He looked at me as if I had asked the silliest question he had ever heard and replied very matter-of-factly that he was sending the balloons to the kids up in heaven. We watched as every balloon faded out of
